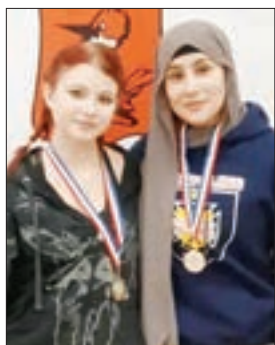

Phytophthora found in Nova Scotian Christmas trees

LUNENBURG COUNTY – This county is considered the Christmas tree capital of the world.

According to Perennia Food and Agriculture Corporation, Nova Scotia has over 300 growers, and around 15,000 acres of Christmas tree land. The industry employs 4,000 full and part-time jobs, in Nova Scotia the Christmas tree industry makes around \$7 million per year, most of which occurs in Lunenburg County.

Recently a strain of phytophthora that affects coniferous trees has been found in the province, including Lunenburg County, with producers who have Fraser Fir trees.

Phytophthora is like a mix of an algae and a fungus. It is an organism that has swimming spores that can move from tree to tree. In fir trees this can infest roots and cause root rot, which can kill a healthy tree in a matter of weeks.

Matt Wright is a member of the Atlantic Christmas Tree Association and a producer of Christmas trees in Lunenburg County.

He says that to prevent the spread of phytophthora, growers should be aware of where they get their seedlings from.

“They should be very careful about where they’re buying their seedlings. You know, we have some wonderful nurseries in Nova Scotia. However, they can’t meet the demand.”

According to Wright, the trees that are currently affected are Fraser firs. Balsam firs appear to have a resistance to phytophthora.

Most of the stock in Nova Scotia is Balsam fir, but there are people importing Fraser firs seedlings for their lots.

Wright says Fraser Firs are “a tree that’s highly desired by consumers, there’s some growing difficulty in our climate, but people have been importing them.”

These imports are the suspected infection

point of the disease in Lunenburg County.

Fraser firs are desirable because they retain their needles for longer periods of time than Balsam and have strong branches. The Balsam firs are the trees that are native to the region.

According to Wright, phytophthora is a bigger issue in Quebec as a higher percentage of their stock is Fraser Firs, but they are now taking preventative measures to protect their stock against pathogens.

When asked about how the industry in Lunenburg County will be affected by the disease Wright said, “I don’t think there’s going to be any immediate impact on the industry short term.” According to Wright, the disease mostly affects younger trees, meaning if any impact was to be seen it would be seen later.

Christmas tree prices in the county should not see an increase in pricing due to the disease.

New Veteran’s Way painted crosswalk given green light by council

BRIDGEWATER – A new, painted crosswalk with a design to honour veterans, will be installed in Bridgewater.

Town council passed a motion at their July 14 meeting to work with representatives of the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) Branch #24 for the design and location of the cross walk. It was also requested that the goal would be to complete it before Nov. 11, 2025.

Representatives of the local RCL branch had approached council with the idea Nov. 25, 2024, and council had passed a motion to direct municipal staff to investigate the feasibility of the proposed cross walk.

After their work was completed, the matter once again came before town council at their July 14 meeting.

“I don’t think there was any question around the table last year when this was brought forward, that it was a good idea,” said Town of Bridgewater Mayor David Mitchell. “The issue was at that time was that we knew that the transportation safety standards needed to be updated. They are the ones that have to do with safety around intersections. We do have clarity on that now.”

He added that there are several safety considerations to be considered for pedestrians and for vehicles.

Dan Hennessey, president of the Bridgewater RCL Branch #24, was the one that came up with the idea.

“I could see the growing trend across Canada

to put these symbols of remembrance in communities,” he said. “I’ve always said that Remembrance Day is Nov. 11, but remembering the sacrifices that people have made and continue to make is ongoing...There’s no expiration date on remembering.”

Before going to council last November, he had put the idea out on social media, and he indicated the response was incredible. Very quickly, he had three people willing to sponsor the crosswalk with donations of \$1,000 each. He also had an artist, who reached out and indicated that he would be willing to do some work on it.

He was excited by the fact that the council, at the November meeting, was very enthusiastic about the project and voted unanimously in favour of it, just like in the July 14 meeting.

Where will it go?

Staff came up with a couple of suggestions for locations, one near the RCL building at the

crosswalk of Dominion and Churchill Streets, and another, the existing driveway entrance to Brookside Cemetery on York Street, where a crosswalk could be established.

Both locations took into consideration the significance for Legion members and the lower volume of traffic in these locations to increase longevity of the paint.

“The most important piece of this was to make sure that it was done in collaboration with the legion so that its location is meaningful,” said Mitchell.

Hennessey says that he has a meeting coming up this week, with Director of Engineering Matthew Davidson to discuss the location and design.

The work will be completed by a third party and town staff estimate the cost to be about \$3,000 based on the most recent cost of the rainbow crosswalk installed at the intersection of King and Dominion Streets.

BPS execute search warrant; asking for public’s help

BRIDGEWATER – On July 11, Bridgewater Police Service’s (BPS) Criminal Investigative Division and patrol officers completed a Warrant to Search at a King Street residence.

A stun gun, ammunition, imitation handgun, brass knuckles, collapsible baton, cash, and drug paraphernalia were located inside the residence.

Stemming from the completion of the Warrant to Search, Cody Trimper faced the following charges: uttering threats to cause bodily harm; two counts of possession of a prohibited device/weapon; four counts of possession of a prohibited weapon or am-

munition while prohibited by order; two counts of possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose and possession of a prohibited device without licence.

Trimper has been on a 10-year Firearms Prohibition Order since 2017. He is currently under a Lifetime Prohibited Device/Weapon ban.

He was remanded to provincial custody and appeared at Bridgewater Provincial Court on July 14 where he was released with conditions from the court. Conditions included remaining away from the Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) victim of the uttering threats charge.

On July 16, Bridgewater Police Service arrested Trimper after he assaulted the same IPV victim. Stemming from that incident, he faces these additional charges: assault, administering a noxious substance; unlawful confinement; uttering threats to an additional party; possession of a weapon; and two counts of breaking the release order issued July 14.

Trimper was held in police custody and attended court.

The judicial system needs to step up. It’s disheartening, you know, you’re revictimizing the victim again. So, there needs to be a stronger role when it comes to domestic violence.”

UPDATE ON THE LAHAVE RIVER INCIDENT

A Lunenburg County man drowned in the LaHave river on July 14.

While the name of the Lunenburg County man has not yet been released by the police, the police did say he was 37 years of age.

Because of his age and the circumstances around his death the medical

examiner will be preforming a toxicological report.

BPS Deputy Chief Danny MacPhee said in a recent interview that “He was out in the water swimming. We don’t know exactly why he was in the water swimming it’s not a common place for people to go for a swim.”

According to MacPhee, the full medical examiners report could take anywhere from three weeks to six months.

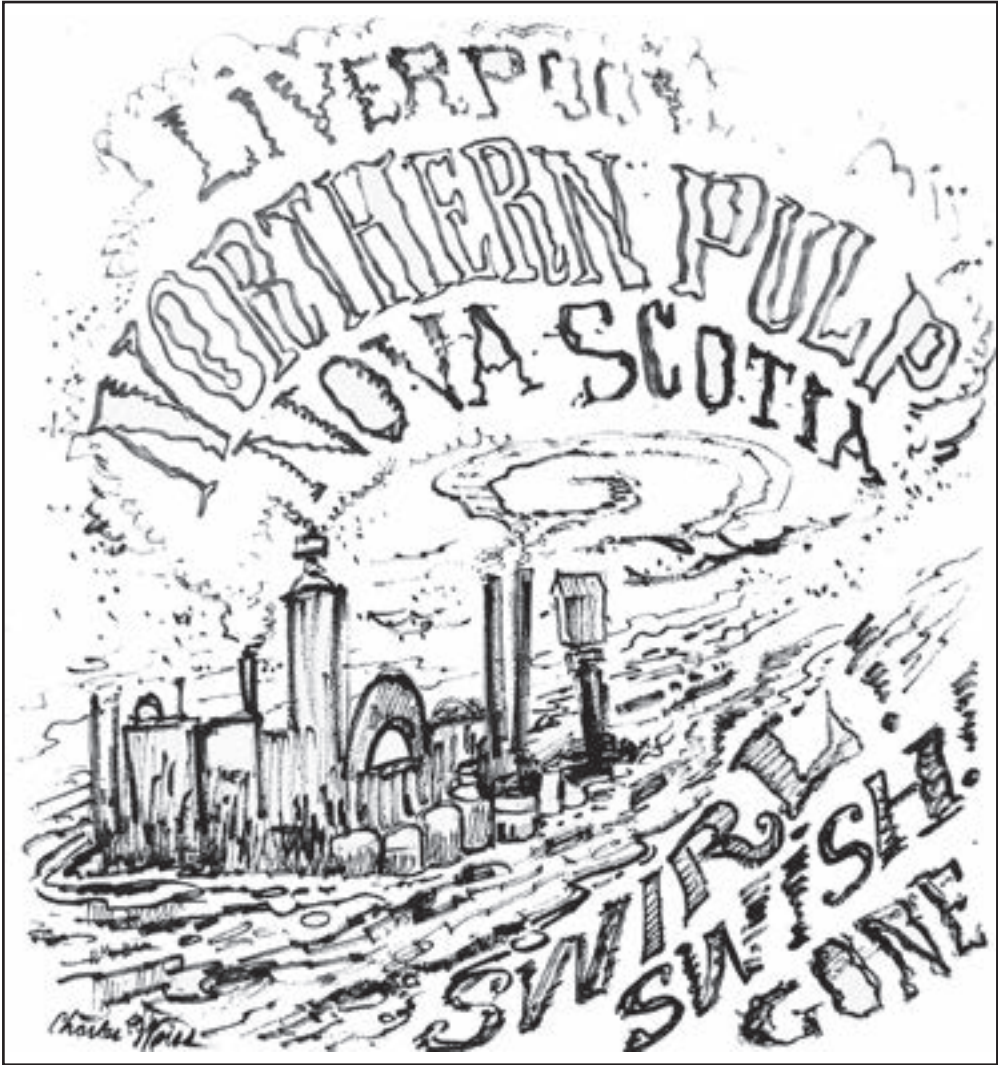
Stealing flowers from a grave site is disrespectful

RCMP NEWS

RCMP officers have been busy so far this summer. Here are just a few of the most recent incidents they have been dealing with.

• **July 18 (news release)** - Lunenburg District RCMP is investigating a fatal crash that occurred in Petite Riviere.

On July 17, at approximately 11:40 a.m., Lunenburg District RCMP, fire services and EHS responded to a report of a single-vehicle crash on Italy Cross Rd.

Upon arrival, RCMP officers learned that an Infiniti Q50 had been travelling south when it left the road, went down an embankment and came to rest in the ditch.

The driver of the car, a 34-year-old man from Middle Sackville, was pronounced deceased at the scene. The passenger, a 32-year-old woman from Burlington, Ont., suffered life-threatening injuries and was transported to hospital by EHS LifeFlight. A dog who was riding inside the car was also found deceased.

An RCMP collision reconstructionist attended the location of the crash;

the investigation is ongoing.

The southern section of Italy Cross Rd. near Petite Riviere was closed for several hours.

• **July 17** – Officers arrested three people in the early hours of July 17 on the Middlewood Diversion. Police were executing a search warrant as part of an ongoing investigation.

The road was closed to traffic for a time and there was no risk to public safety, according to a social media post.

• **July 16** - Lunenburg District RCMP has charged a man in relation to an incident that occurred in Union Square.

On July 13, at approximately 9:10 p.m., Lunenburg District RCMP responded to a report of a tractor ramming into an occupied home in the 4300 block of Cornwall Rd. Upon arrival, officers observed a man actively destroying the residence with a large farm vehicle.

The person inside the residence at the time is known to the man. They did not report any physical injuries.

Sheldon Rex MacKay, 55, from New

Germany, was safely arrested at the scene. He's been charged with: Mischief Causing Danger to Life; Mischief; Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle; and Failure to Comply with Undertaking

MacKay was remanded into custody, appeared in Bridgewater Provincial Court on July 14, and was released on conditions.

• **JULY 14** - Lunenburg District RCMP is investigating a fatal crash that occurred in Aspotogan.

On July 13, at approximately 10:40 a.m., Lunenburg District RCMP and EHS responded to a report that a man and a motorcycle had been observed off Hwy. 329. The 70-year-old man of Hubley, who was the sole rider of the motorcycle, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The initial investigation indicates the motorcycle left Hwy. 329 at a sharp turn and went over an embankment.

An RCMP collision reconstructionist attended the scene and the investigation is ongoing. Hwy. 329 was closed for several hours.

Community leader spearheading funding drive for new gymnasium

BRIDGEWATER – A concerted effort, headed by South Shore basketball coach Mustapha Maynard, to build a new athletic facility in the Bridgewater area, is picking up momentum.

Maynard coaches basketball at Park View Education Centre and is the founder of the South Shore Lightning basketball club, a registered non-profit organization serving youth and families in the area.

“It’s been in the work for the past few years,” he said regarding the facility. “It’s always been my goal to open a facility, not just for basketball, but after-school programs and we’re looking at collaborating with the pickleball community as well.”

He mentioned that cheer and daycare programs, along with the municipality-run programs are among the many others who are always on the lookout for more gym time.

Maynard said he has been in talks with a couple of entities that he hopes to partner with and is hopeful for the next meeting.

“The one meeting I am looking forward to is with the YMCA, because they are also looking to have their own gym as well.”

But the biggest push, or the top item on his chart, is the need for the Lightning basketball club that continues to grow each year since he started it in 2021. Right now, they have about 150 players of all ages, but he said the community is looking for more offerings, especially for the younger groups.

But, of course, gym availability is limited.

Maynard added that along with a hard court,

there is also room set aside in the facility for professional massage therapists and more.

A feasibility study has already been completed, the blueprints are ready, and plans are in place. The next steps are to find the right partners, find a good location and raise money.

He hopes to raise \$350,000 for the facility that is estimated to cost around \$4.5 million to complete, adding that he has been working hard to find funding sources for the rest of the funds needed.

As for a timeline... a goal is to have funding in place, a location found, and shovels in the ground within 365 days. Construction time for the facility, he estimates, would be between two-to-three years.

As for the location, he said they have looked at a couple of places within Bridgewater, but he is meeting with the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg during the first part of August to discuss the situation.

There is a GoFundMe Page that has started with the goal of raising at least \$16,000 this way.

Area athletes gearing up for Canada Games

SOUTH SHORE – The South Shore will be well represented on Team Nova Scotia that will compete in St. John’s, Newfoundland and Labrador from Aug. 8 to 25.

Three young wrestlers and a Special Olympic athlete are among the many that will be putting their best foot forward to compete for a spot on the podium in the 17 sport events available.

Among these heading out from the area are wrestlers Remi Davidson, Shahad Alough and Ella Turpin who compete with their school teams and the Predator Wrestling Club, based out of Park View Education Centre. Also, their local coach, Amanda Silver will be part of the coaching staff for the event.

On the swimming side, Aiyah Peters will be trying to bring home a medal.

Starting with the wrestling side, Alough is 17 years of age and will be going into Grade 12 this year at Park View Education Centre. She has been wrestling since Grade 10.

She had an excellent year on the mat and earned a provincial championship.

“This year was really good. I worked hard over the summer to do well, and I achieved my goals,” she said, adding that she was the only female that competed for the school this year and hopes more will join her.

She really enjoys the coaches who she feels “really helped” her enjoy the sport and looks forward to continuing for years to come.

She said she enjoys spending time with her teammates and meeting many others also.

About being named to Team Nova Scotia?

“It’s incredible. I’m so happy, I can’t even express how happy I am,” she said. “I’m glad that I made it and I’m looking forward to representing Team Nova Scotia at the Canada Games.”

She will be competing in the 65 kg category.

Turpin, at 15 years of age, is just in her first year of wrestling and she did

well, earning 11 medals and capturing the provincial championship at both the school (Hebbsville Academy) and club tournaments.

“I did not expect to do that well,” she said. “My big accomplishment this year was winning provincial gold in Yarmouth.”

About competing at the Canada Games...

“I’m really excited, but also a little nervous. I haven’t been wrestling for very long and I feel that people will be more experienced than me,” she mentioned. “I would like to place, but just like win a couple of matches at least. I’m cool with that.”

She really enjoys wrestling and hopes to continue through her high school years and beyond, if she has the opportunity.

“It’s a good way to express myself and I’ve met a lot of people through it.”

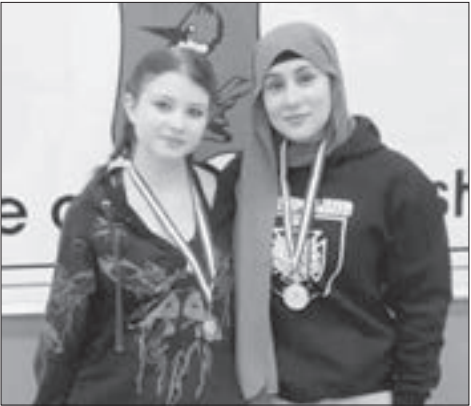
At the Canda Games, she will be in the 56 kg division.

Her favourite move is the side suplex, but she hopes to work on her ground game as the Games approach.

Davidson began wrestling when he was in Grade 9 and he recently graduated from Park View Education Centre.

“I’m pretty excited,” about being named to Team Nova Scotia. “I’m excited for the experience because of what people told me about it. They said it was a surreal experience and suggested taking it all in.”

Davidson said he had a great season and went undefeated in Nova Scotia and earned a provincial title, working his way up to the top.

In Grade 10, he finished in third place; in Grade 11, second; and in Grade 12, champion.

He acknowledged that he did suffer some defeats but used them as learning experiences. One was against a P.E.I. wrestler and in a tournament in Ontario, he “was less successful.”

His favourite part of the sport is “the discipline. It gives me something to work on and work for. It gives me a sense of purpose.”

Davidson is headed to Acadia University in the fall, working towards getting his Certificate of Applied Science which will lead to an engineering degree.

He hopes to continue to wrestle but knows that he may have a heavy workload ahead.

His favourite move?

“I’m really a legs kind of guy. My go to moves are single legs or ankle picks. But what I’m really known for are my lace moves, a continuous move that you can do to score points. That’s what I go for.”

Heading into the Canada Games, he said he hopes to work on his explosiveness, so “I can hopefully run through those guys.” He will be competing in the 56 kg weight class.

His goal is to end up on the podium, but “would be happy just to know that I did my best and win a couple of matches.”

Coach Silver, who coaches athletes from across the South Shore including these three athletes, said she is very proud of these athletes.

“They’ve worked really hard and not only are they great athletes, but they’re great people as well.”

She said that she would argue with anyone that wrestling is the hardest sport that you can take part in.

“I always tell this to like basketball players. You’re fine to throw a ball but try throwing something that is trying to throw you back,” she said. “It is difficult, physically and mentally. The athletes use every single muscle, going flat out for five or six minutes.”


This is her second go-around at the Games, attending the last one as an assistant coach. She said it is a big experience but says that her wrestlers will be ready.

“I am not sure I was ready my first year. You walk into the opening ceremonies, and it feels like the Olympics, so much is going on. It’s the best competition, featuring the best wrestlers in the county. But I think they will be ready. They all have individual things that they need to work on, but I know that when they go to the mat, they will give their best. That’s all we ask. It’s a huge accomplishment just to make it.”

She explained that the wrestling competition is held over three days. The first two days are team days, and each wrestler may have up to five matches as they try and collect points for their team. On the third day, they will compete for themselves, and may have two or more matches, depending on how well they do.

Peters has been swimming competitively for about 13 years, 11 of them as part of the Bridgewater Baracudas swim club.

What if you could create your perfect wife, husband or friend? A buddy who responds in exactly the right way? You'd never hear a complaint. You'd never feel alone. You'd have a companion to make your life complete. Wouldn't that be awesome?

You see, I've been reading articles about people, particularly young people, who are interacting with AI companions.

AI refers to Artificial Intelligence, and whether you realize it or not, you may already be using it. For example, if you've visited a company website in recent years and engaged in a text conversation with a customer service agent, it's possible that you were talking to a chatbot. AI is the "brains" behind those chatbots.

But an "AI companion" is much more than a chatbot. I did a little search for how to create AI friends and wow! There are a lot of possibilities!

You can create a virtual friend on a phone or computer. Some companies enable you to choose what your com-

panion will look like and essentially define their personality. They'll chat with you, and more advanced versions even allow you to specify a voice, see facial expressions and body language.

Many of us bond with non-humans to some degree. Our beloved cats and dogs are good examples. We talk to them; they look at us with what we could believe are eyes filled with understanding and love.

They wag their tails, purr and communicate in other ways. They are not the same as a human companion, but then, they don't try to tell us what to

Even more importantly, if you're so fortunate to have a truly caring relationship, whether partner, spouse, or friend, you know that a satisfying relationship doesn't only deliver what we want to hear. Sometimes it's helpful to hear a hard truth, best delivered by a loving person who cares about us.

Migration to start soon

Bird Notes

As I write, this it is hard to believe that the summer is almost over and that our resident breeders will be moving out in migration in a week or so.

Most of the osprey nests that I've been observing have the adults showing signs that young are present in the nests. I was only able to confirm two young in the nest by the Petite Riviere General Store on July 13 and one young bird at the old Cinplex Theatre in Bridgewater on July 14.

When I was growing up, I always knew the osprey as a fish hawk as that is what my parents called them. I was in my teenage years before I knew this bird by its proper name of the osprey.

The osprey is the provincial bird of Nova Scotia. The osprey is 52.5 to 61.25 cm long with a wingspread of 135 to 180 cm. The females are larger than the males. Sexes outwardly are alike with the adults very dark brown above with a purplish gloss and clear white below.

The breast is somewhat spotted or streaked with

brown. The head is largely white with a broad black mark through the cheeks. The sides of the neck, bill and claws are black. The eyes are yellow to brown. The legs and feet are green-white.

On July 10, Kathleen MacAulay found a stilt sandpiper at Beach Meadows Beach. On July 13 Jason Dain noted numbers of short-billed dowitchers and lesser yellowlegs there. On July 14 I found two semi-palmated plovers and a sanderling at Crescent Beach.

On July 4 Ray Wershler located a whimbrel at Hartlen Point West Beach. Mark Dennis reported a stilt sandpiper with short-billed dowitchers at the Guzzle on Cape Sable Island on July 9.

On July 12 Phil Taylor found a Hudsonian godwit at Lower Barneys River. Natalie Barkhouse-Bishop discovered two black terns at the Amherst Marsh. Logan LaLonde saw a parasitic jaeger chasing American herring gulls at Scots Bay. On July 13 Andrew Bates sighted two pomarine jaegers and a sooty shearwater at Port George. Again, another week of few reports.

I'll be leading a field trip for the Nova Scotia Bird

Society on July 26 with a storm date of July 27. The trip starts at the three churches in Mahone Bay at 8:30 a.m.

We bird some of Mahone Bay, The Dynamite Trail, Long Hill, some of the Bay-to-Bay trail from the Mahone Bay side, then Mader's Cove and end up at Second Peninsula. You do not need to be a member of the bird society to attend.

Cellular services in the province expand

New tower comes online in Middle Ohio

PROVINCE - The Nova Scotia government’s plan to expand cellular service to thousands of Nova Scotians in poor reception areas has reached another step forward with new towers now active at three sites in southwest Nova Scotia and a site east of Halifax. Fourteen additional sites set to be upgraded by the end of the year.

More than \$69 million has been invested to date in the Cellular for Nova Scotia Program, a multi-year, multi-phase effort to bring cellular service to unserved areas across the province.

The towers are in Yarmouth County, Shelburne County, Digby County, Halifax County, and will bring stronger connectivity, safety and access for people living, working and travelling in dozens of communities around those areas. The tower in Shelburne County is in the community of Middle Ohio.

The Middle Ohio tower and the other towers are owned by the Toronto-based telecommunication company Rogers. If you get service from another provider, you will need to check with your provider whether they have a roaming agreement or share towers with Rogers.

“With these towers now up and running, we’re making it safer and more connected for people in these communities,” said Public Works Minister Fred Tilley, also the Minister responsible for Build Nova Scotia in a press release. “Whether calling for help in an emergency, staying in touch with family, working from home or learning online, reliable cellular service makes a real difference.”

Overall, Rogers is upgrading 27 sites through phase one of the Cellular for Nova Scotia Program. The Government of Nova Scotia will add 27 provincially owned towers to further expand coverage in phase two.

“We are proud to bring 5G services to communities in Nova Scotia with our government partners, closing wireless gaps and improving coverage for residents, visitors and businesses. With these four towers now in service, more people in the region now have access to the largest and most reliable 5G+ network in Canada,” said Mark Kennedy, Chief technology officer at Rogers in a press release.

As of now, no towers are set to be constructed or upgraded in Lunenburg County, according to the government website. However, the locations of phase two constructions and upgrades have not yet been announced.

The 21-year-old athlete is well known for her competitiveness, but also for helping others and coaching others. She is a helper around the pool and for that she had the Barracuda’s sportsmanship award renamed in her honour in 2021, the year that she won it.

She also won the Lunenburg-Queens Special Olympics 2025 Amanda Robar Spirit award.

Her favourite sayings are: “It’s always very important to be a good sport”; “It is always very important to have very good sportsmanship”; and “Never brag when you win and never get upset when you lose.

In the pool, she is most proud of winning the gold medal in the 400m freestyle race in summer swim program in 2021.

She enjoys swimming the longer races, such as the 400m, 800m and 1,500m freestyle events.

In 2024, she earned five gold medals at the Nova Scotia Special Olympics Summer Games held at Acadia University, in the 200m individual medley, 100m butterfly, 200m freestyle, 400m freestyle and 1,500m freestyle races.

What does she like most about swimming?

“Going to race at swim meets, developing skills at practises and cheering everyone on to do their

best. I love being in the water, getting medals and ribbons and making friends along the way.”

At this year’s Games, her first, she will compete in the 50m breaststroke; 50m and 100m backstroke and the 50m and 100m freestyle.

Just to note, this is just the third consecutive Games that the Special Olympians will have been included in the Games.

How excited is she to be a part of Team Nova Scotia?

“I am always very happy, excited and proud to be part of Team Nova Scotia This is a huge honour! I am looking forward to this wonderful, positive opportunity! I love swimming!”

Peters has been training hard with her local Special Olympics Team weekly in Bridgewater for over a year under head coach Kevin Wilson and assistant coaches Jenn Kreilberg, Vanessa Miller and Barb Battiste.

She has also been doing additional elite swim training with four other Special Olympic swimmers, making up the Team Nova Scotia contingent and Canada Games coach (Mike Balmaceda,) leading up to the Games

She will also compete at the 2025 Special Olympics Nova Scotia Summer Games at St Francis Xavier University, July 24-27. It will be her final race tune up before heading to the 2025 Canada Summer Games.

Meter Reading in Your Community

Over the summer you may see members of the Nova Scotia Power team reading meters on homes and businesses in your community.

Meters have continued to accurately record energy use throughout the cyber incident but are unable to send that information back to our billing systems right now. As a result, when billing resumed, most customers started receiving estimated bills based on past use. To provide customers with a bill based on actual energy use, rather than an estimate, Nova Scotia Power has temporarily returned to physical meter reading.

Meter readers wear Nova Scotia Power branded clothing and carry an ID badge. You do not need to be home for your meter to be read.
