## Lunenburg County to host 55+ provincial games

LUNENBURG COUNTY – The biennial 55+ Games are coming back to Lunenburg County.

The official kick-off was held Feb. 26 at the Lunenburg County Lifestyle Centre. The area will welcome 700+ competitors to the area Sept. 21-24, back for the first time since 2017.

The events will take place across the municipality in Chester, Bridgewater, Lunenburg, Mahone Bay and Liverpool.

Some sports qualify the winners to advance to the National Games, held every two years. The next one will be held in 2026.

The Games are designed to be inclusive, ensuring that everyone can join in the fun regardless of their abilities.

“I think one of the mandates is not only to provide sports to get to a national level but also giving the 55+ community the opportunity to get out and socialize and be a part of the community,” said Joanne Fury, co-chair of the host committee. “It’s everything from hockey, track and field, biking, bowling to brain games of chess and cards.”

She said that there really aren’t any qualifiers used to participate in the Games. It’s a matter of just signing up and preparing.

Fury said the economic spinoff from hosting the Games is quite significant with an es-

estimated \$500,000 or above, that will be spent in the area.

In 2017, the event was bid for by the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg. This year, the Lunenburg County Lifestyle Centre

initiated the bid.

The event will rely a lot on volunteers and sponsorship.

“Again welcoming 700 people to the area, it is a big undertaking and there’s obviously a big cost associated with it,” said Fury, indicating that they have set a budget of \$200,000. “We do have some great partnerships with the municipalities, but we will also be looking for other sponsors to help with the cost.

“Along with that, we will need at least 100 volunteers to help put it on.”

She said there are many ways and many places that you can volunteer – from working at the closing or opening ceremonies, the social events, or at the venues. You can sign up now by going to their newly launched website at [www.ns55plus.ca](http://www.ns55plus.ca).

There are several ways to get involved. As an athlete, participants of all abilities are encouraged to sign up. Athlete registration will begin in May.

As a volunteer, you can take part in event co-ordination, hospitality, opening and closing ceremonies and social events.

## Police investigating Intimate Partner Violence homicide in Bridgewater

BRIDGEWATER – A man is in custody after a woman was found deceased after an intimate partner homicide inside the married couples’ residence in Bridgewater on Sunday morning.

Eighty-five-year-old Andrew Dawson Tanner has been charged with first degree murder in the death of his wife, Patricia Annette Tanner, 83.

At 11:41 a.m. on Sunday, March 2, Bridgewater Police Service (BPS) responded to a 911 call from an address on Haven Drive in Bridgewater for a female in medical distress, according to a media release from the

Bridgewater Police Service, issued March 3.

After arriving on scene, police located Patricia from Bridgewater inside the residence from which the 911 call originated. She was injured from what appeared to be an assault with a weapon.

She was assessed by Emergency Health Services (EHS) medics and was later pronounced dead at the scene. Her husband, Andrew, was located with related injuries inside a second room of the same residence.

There have not been any prior documented incidents of intimate partner violence connected to these individuals.

Thirty thousand outstanding individuals across the country nominated by their peers will receive the medal for their contributions and service to their communities and serves as a visible and tangible way to honour their works.

## Police investigating Intimate Partner Violence homicide in Bridgewater

Andrew was subsequently transported to South Shore Regional Hospital while in police custody by EHS, where he was treated for his wounds, according to the release.

He made his court appearance from hospital March 3. He is expected to remain in hospital for the next few days and will remain in custody until his next court appearance March 2.

Police subsequently executed a Warrant to Search at the residence to preserve and locate evidence. Forensic Identification Officers from both BPS and Truro Police Service processed the scene.

The Nova Scotia Medical Examiner Service has been engaged in this ongoing investigation. Police cannot speculate on the cause of death until an autopsy is completed by this service.

As further information arises, police will provide additional updates to the public.

The male in custody is scheduled to appear from hospital before Bridgewater Provincial Court on March 3.

**INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE**

In September 2024, the Nova Scotia Government passed Bill 482, declaring intimate partner violence (IPV) an epidemic in Nova Scotia.

- Intimate partner violence may include any of:
- Physical or sexualized violence, like hitting, slapping, kicking, pushing, strangulation, forcing sex without consent or without contraception;
  - Emotional abuse like humiliation, repeated name calling, shaming, extreme jealousy;
  - Threats of violence to a person, their children, pets or family members or threatening suicide;
  - Coercive control, such as stalking or controlling a person's finances, movements, phone calls, texts or choice of clothing.

If you or someone you know is experiencing intimate partner violence, help and support is available.

There is a 24-hour helpline that can be reached at 1-855-255-0220 that provides advice and support for those who are experiencing or concerned about intimate partner violence. You can also dial 211 for a variety of help lines, including mental health support. Please call 911 if in immediate danger.

## Unwanted winter tenants: Making our homes pest free

Most of us are seeking warmth during the frigid winters. Research indicates that the extremely cold conditions may be a reality even with the complex issue of global warming gnawing on our minds.

But we are not the only ones seeking relief from the cold. Pests such as cockroaches, mice, rats, spiders and others are also seeking a means of survival such as food, water, mates and shelter. Our cozy homes are an attraction to these pests, all of whom are unwelcome tenants.

Knowing which areas of our homes are most attractive, or 'hot spots' for these pests will help you monitor and correct issues for vulnerable entry sites. Trash cans, dumpsters, storage rooms and areas behind large pieces of furniture are just a few most at risk.

It all starts outdoors, the current abode of these

pests. The perimeter of your home should be checked for potential entry points. Vegetation is used as feeding sites, so ensure your home's entrances are well maintained by diligent landscaping including trimming trees and removing leaves as soon as possible so that these pests cannot use them for cover.

Clean up spills and food particles within your home as soon as they occur, remove trash regularly and also remove sources of moisture such as leaky HVAC units, any standing water by having the land excavated so that the ground slopes away from the home.

BRIDGEWATER – The South Shore I.C.E. Storm para hockey club will host the National Para Hockey Championships this coming May 15-18.

The announcement was made at a media event at the host site, the Lunenburg County Lifestyle Centre, on Feb. 27.

Speakers including Rick Amey, chair for para ice hockey in Nova Scotia and this year's championship director; Town of Bridgewater Mayor David Mitchell; Chasidy Veinotte, deputy mayor for the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg and Marta Selassie, interim general manager at the LCLC.

Co-chairs of the event, Brian Zwicker and Joe Boutilier were also on hand to answer any questions.

"This will be the first time that the championships have been held in Atlantic Canada, and there is no better place to host them, than right here in Bridgewater," said Amey.

"The Canadian Para Ice Hockey Championships serve as a vital platform for athletes with and without disabilities, promoting inclusivity and showcasing the talent and determination of para-athletes.

Teams competing will be coming from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec and Team Atlantic, who will have

several local athletes on their roster.

The excitement begins with round-robin games, taking place from May 15 to 17. The semifinals, along with the bronze and gold medal games will be held May 18.

Town of Bridgewater Mayor David Mitchell said he is a big fan of the sport.

"This is exciting. We've had a few sledge tournaments here that have been an incredible opportunity for people to get to know the sport and also get to know our facilities, our region and our town," he said.

"I've explained a few times; I am

not a huge hockey fan, but I am a huge sledge hockey fan. I find it to be just the extreme side of hockey. I'm very excited and I know that anyone who has attended in the past competitions will also be wanting to attend this."

Mitchell added that the fact that fans can watch for free is just another barrier broken down and showcases the "accessibility and inclusivity that

this sport brings."

Veinotte said that the first time she watched a sledge hockey game she "had no idea how competitive you were...This is a tremendous opportunity for the LCLC and the region."

Selassie, on behalf of the LCLC staff added, "We are thrilled to be the host venue for the 2025 national para hockey championships. This is an incredible opportunity to showcase the talent, dedication and resilience of para hockey athletes and we couldn't be more excited to welcome teams, fans and supporters to our community.

"At the LCLC one of our core goals is to foster and promote inclusion, diversity, equity and accessibility. Hosting events like the national para hockey championships reinforces our commitment to creating a welcoming place for all."

# “Dangerous” books on display at Margaret Hennigar Library

BRIDGEWATER – South Shore Public Libraries is making what some would consider “dangerous books” available to all.

In recognition of Freedom to Read week, the library has unveiled the Book Sanctuary Collection; 50 books which have been challenged, censored, or removed from schools and libraries across North America.

Freedom to Read Week, February 23 - March 1, is an annual event that encourages Canadians to think about and reaffirm their commitment to intellectual freedom.

The Book Sanctuary Collection, now on display at the Margaret Hennigar Library in Bridgewater is designed to champion the cause of intellectual freedom and the freedom to read.

Books in the collection have faced challenges for reasons such as coarse language, sexuality, religious and anti-religious positions, the portrayal of race or sexual orientation, political and social themes, or for promoting misinformation and conspiracy theories.

The list includes books and graphic novels by re-

nowned authors such as Harper Lee, Maya Angelou, Kurt Vonnegut, Salman Rushdie, John Steinbeck, Stephen King, Toni Morrison and George Orwell as well as newer books by George M Johnson, Ahmad Danny Ramadan and Jazz Jennings.

In a release, South Shore Public Libraries says it is dedicated to maintaining the principles of a free and open society by keeping open pathways for understanding and empathy, and ensuring readers have access to a wide range of viewpoints and stories.

Library CEO Ashley Nunn-Smith said in the release, “Intellectual freedom is a cornerstone of democratic societies, allowing individuals to explore

ideas without restriction. The Book Sanctuary initiative reinforces the importance of protecting this freedom, ensuring that literature remains a space for exploration, diversity, and the free exchange of ideas”.

The Book Sanctuary movement began in 2022 at the Chicago Public Library. South Shore Public Libraries was inspired to participate after the Toronto Public Libraries joined in 2023.

Library users will be able to sign the books out after March 10. Until then, patrons can search, browse, and place books from the collection on hold at southshorepubliclibraries.ca using the keywords SSPL Book Sanctuary.

Repair leaking basement floors by sealing cracks and crannies, ensure crawlspaces are well-ventilated, use exhaust fans in bathrooms and kitchens to remove moisture for those moisture-loving pests such as centipedes, earwigs and silverfish. These pests thrive on moisture for not only thriving but breeding.

Unused clothing should be placed into containers or bags and washed before storing away and vacuum your carpets and rugs often.

### SOME PESTS ARE HARMLESS, WHILE OTHERS ARE NOT

Insects such as centipedes and millipedes are harmless and considered beneficial since they eat smaller insects. Ladybugs or termites can bite and leave stains and odours. Ticks and cockroaches are disease, bacteria and virus carriers.

Consider pest-resistant plants at all entrances of the home. These include lavender, citronella grass, petunias and nasturtium, for example, all of which exhibit

a strong scent not favoured by most pests. Position these plants at all entrances and holes or cracks to ensure pests don't make their way inside.

### ECO-FRIENDLY VS CHEMICAL CONTROL METHODS

If possible, avoid using chemical-based pest control and consider eco-friendly methods that may require more frequent applications and are slower in providing results, but they help preserve our precious bee populations and ecosystems.

Chemical pest control methods rely upon the use of synthetic compounds and harsh chemicals that have an immediate result but have long-lasting effects on our environment, our most endearing commodity, that both enriches our physical and physical well-being.

## When our choices are questioned

We make decisions each day; some big, many small. Many of us like to believe that we make those decisions based on logic and facts. We weigh pros and cons and we make the best possible choice based on the information that we have at the time.

I'm sure that there are times when that's exactly how it happens, too!

If you've been reading these columns for awhile, then you already know that Dr. Glasser suggests that we choose our actions in attempts to satisfy our needs. Our needs aren't necessarily selfish needs, but they are needs nevertheless. We act to try to turn the real world into the world that we'd like to be living in.

In some cases, that means that we make choices that might seem illogical or even counter-productive. For example, you might make the choice to spend long days at work to satisfy your need for security. However, this could result in missing out on building close relationships with family or friends, thus frustrating your need for love and belonging.

Maybe the need for love and belonging is not all that strong for you; you don't need lots of interaction to feel that you belong. Or maybe you would like to have more connection with people, but you're prepared to forego that immediate pleasure for more satisfying interactions in the future, like hosting get-togethers in your cottage by the lake. You know, that cottage that you'll only be able to afford if you put in long hours at work now.

To the family or friends who are missing your companionship now, your choices may seem irrational, even selfish. Sadly, these different perspectives of the same situation can result in relationship difficulties.

While each of us can only control our own choices, the choices that we make do often have an impact on

others. Unless both parties have some shared understanding of why we are making the choices that we make, conflicts can arise.

For example, why not spend all of our savings on a family vacation? Why can't we have the same luxuries that everyone else seems to have? Why are you spending all of your free time doing difficult study or hard manual labour rather than hanging out with friends, like other people do?

If your choices are being questioned in a way that is causing frustration or even conflict, here are two observations you might find helpful to keep in mind.

First, conclusions and consequences

that are perfectly self-evident to you or to me may not be at all obvious to everyone! This shows up particularly when choices involve making short-term sacrifices for potentially long-term future benefits. You might find it hard to believe, but not everyone understands that making trade-offs now could result in a brighter tomorrow.

Second, everyone doesn't have the same strength of each need. For example, one person may be satisfied with occasional interactions; someone else may perceive they've been abandoned unless they talk every day. Thus, one person may view an expensive holiday as an essential young-family

experience, while another sees a college fund as the way to demonstrate parental love.

What's the solution? By now, you may be thinking that talking to each other is at least a step in a good direction. My suggestion is that if you keep these two points in mind during your conversation, you may find the discussion will bear more fruit and less frustration.

# The Barrow's Goldeneye

I was pleased to see a male and female Barrow's goldeneye in front of my house in LaHave.

I had seen these birds almost every day for two weeks. This species nests from Alaska to the Mackenzie and northwest British Columbia and south to Washington, Oregon and into California.

They also nest in Colorado, the Rockies, and in Quebec, Labrador, Greenland and Iceland. They winter from Alaska south along the Pacific coast to California and from British Columbia and in Montana, to Utah, Colorado and along the Atlantic coast from the Gulf of St. Lawrence south regularly to Massachusetts and to Long Island, New York. In the last Breeding Bird Atlas of the Maritime

Provinces there are no records for breeding.

The Barrow's goldeneye is a diving duck, 40 to 50 cm long with a wingspread of 75 cm or more. The feathers of the crown and nape are elongated making the head appear

large and bushy on a thin neck.

The male has a black head usually with a white crescent in front of each eye. The head has a purplish gloss. The head has an abrupt forehead and low crown and the scapulars have a row of white spots. The female is brown-grey above and whitish below. There is a white collar and large white wing markings. She has a shorter and deeper bill than the common goldeneye female. This bill may become all yellow in spring.

The Barrow's goldeneye feeds on aquatic insects, crayfishes and some plant foods. They also take some small fishes, eggs of salmon, flesh of salmon that has died, mollusks, blue mussels, periwinkles and other gastropods. They will eat sea urchins, starfish and marine worms. I saw them eating green crabs.

On a bird outing with the community college for their environmental class on Feb. 20, we had a male gadwall and a Eurasian wigeon on the Lunenburg waterfront. Logan Moore had a male Barrow's goldeneye at Thomas Rad-dall Provincial Park on that day.

There were two gadwalls tending in Lunenburg along the waterfront on Feb. 22. A reliable source saw a snowy owl at Crescent Beach on

Feb. 21 and 22. On Feb. 23 Natalie Barkhouse-Bishop reported a Carolina wren at the residence of Jane Dunlop-Stevenson along Main Street in Liverpool.

Kevin Lantz found a small group of Bohemian waxwings at Front Centre on Feb. 24. This is a species that has been very scarce this winter with only one other report in Lunenburg County. Lise Bell has been seeing a black-bellied plover at Crescent Beach and on Feb. 25 she had two sanderlings there. The varied thrush continues at White Point at the residence of Marg Millard.

On Feb. 20, JD Bharvad saw a tufted duck at the Beacon Street Dam in Cape Breton. On Feb. 22 Natalie Barkhouse-Bishop and Lori Buhlman had a Wilson's snipe at Bisset's Lake. Angela MacDonald continues to have a fox sparrow in her yard.
