



## Local firefighters join to fight Dalhousie Fire

**ANNAPOLIS COUNTY** – With the fire raging in West Dalhousie to the size of 7,780 hectares. Many fire departments from across the province and the country have been called in to assist with the blaze that grew even more over the week and weekend, as the evacuation zone expands eastward to Highway 10.

The new evacuation zone is in effect for over 100 homes in the area, evacuees have been told to register at the go to a new Emergency Reception Centre NSCC Middleton. “The fire damaged a number of homes Sunday, August 24, after intensifying in the afternoon and evening. The exact number is yet to be confirmed” according to an Aug. 25 provincial media release.

The wildfire is producing enough smoke to create air quality alerts by the province in Queens County, and Annapolis County. On Aug. 21 smoke could be seen and smelled in Bridgewater and in Mahone Bay.

Expected rain (as of Monday noon) was not expected to have a significant impact on the fire.

In a news release Sunday, Aug. 17, the federal

government approved aid with assisting Nova Scotia with fighting the Annapolis blaze.

Eleanor Olszewski, the federal minister of emergency management and community resilience in a press release, said the government is working with the Department of National Defense and the Canadian armed forces to “ensure Nova Scotia has the support it needs.”

One local fire department helping with the Annapolis fire in Lunenburg County is the New Germany Volunteer Fire Department.

The fire department has sent one tanker and one a rotating team of three to operate the tanker.

“One of the things is we did not want our personnel out there for a full day. So that is why we split them up in shifts,” says Blair Lantz the chief of the New Germany Fire department.

“An early team goes out around 7 a.m., works till about 2 p.m. Then we send a relief team out, and they work from about 2:30 to 9 p.m.”

The New Germany Fire Department is focusing on preserving the structures of the homes of people that were evacuate.

“We are concentrating on a community called Hannamville, where all the houses are. We are watering down all the property around those areas.”

Updates on the Annapolis fire and others are posted at 2 p.m. every day on the government of Nova Scotia website.

Other help came in the form of 20 firefighters sent by Ontario. And an additional five firefighters were sent from Prince Edward Island to help fight the Annapolis fire.

Four water skimmer type airplanes also arrived from the Northwest Territories to assist with the Annapolis Fire. Although on Sunday, Aug. 17, the aircraft went to fight a fire in Digby County.

Manitoba sent over two CL415s and a Bird Dog aircraft with an air attack officer, to aid in the Annapolis fire Aug. 19, “Manitobans know wildfire’s toll,” Premier Wab Kinew wrote in a social media post. “Now we’re paying it forward, supporting from coast to coast.”

Unfortunately, an accident occurred on Aug. 15 when one of the Nova Scotian helicopters fighting the Annapolis fire crashed into a lake, severely damaging the invaluable asset.

The Department of Natural Resources confirmed this in a press release at 6:41 p.m., one of its helicopters crashed in shallow water at about 4:24 p.m., Aug. 15, while working on the Long Lake wildfires.

The pilot was conscious and talking with firefighters who quickly reached the aircraft. By 6 p.m. he was rescued from his aircraft and taken for medical assessment.

# A drought in our land and also our spirit in Nova Scotia

There has been a myriad of issues in the last few months that have impacted every person in Nova Scotia.

As a small farmer I want to address the stand still regarding municipal by-laws that effect small farming. If you are not aware of land use bylaws, I urge you to investigate them for your county. In a world where groceries are unaffordable, it is crucial that we do not give up our ability to raise our own food.

Another issue is the corruption regarding NS Power. There are a few lawyers working against this conglomerate, and we need to stay vocal. There was a protest organized, and NO ONE showed up in Halifax. These bills and banking hacks have put our citizens into financial ruin, with no one being held accountable!

Our basic infrastructure is in shambles; our hospitals cannot keep up with patient care and people have died in our emergency rooms. These problems are systemic, and nothing is being done to salvage these institutions.

A factor that is adding more strain is that our population has exploded and cannot be supported.

If you utter the truth, you will be slandered as anti-immigrant and disliking people from other provinces. This is not malice towards people for who they are, but frustration that our failing infrastructure cannot support growth.

I am not from Canada originally; I was able to see the early stages of institutional failure when I met my husband 15 years ago. I was warned then and not caught off guard by the issues here. It's inconceivable that people move here thinking that the grass is greener without knowing the truth.

The reaction you are seeing is rooted in that most Nova Scotians in these conditions cannot support themselves. They cannot even afford basic needs survive. The result is working citizens becoming homeless and reno-victed.



This cascade of issues crushes us; we cannot enjoy or afford life. The Fire Ban and the reactions express these frustrations. This ban was a final straw for so many people, because Nova Scotia is a beautiful place; your average person does not seek to destroy nature.

If we take a Gestalt view of these issues, and look at all the pieces, you can understand why people might feel angry and strained. My husband is a volunteer firefighter in Annapolis County; in the wake of the local wildfires, we have all seen, in real time, how these fires become out of control and how we lack resources to manage large scale catastrophes.

Citizens feel slighted at being fined for going on a trail in the woods without reckless intent, while our province releases a pedophile, who decapitated a little girl, after a 25-year sentence. The dregs of society run free while citizens lack a sense of relief and peace daily.

We have a downtrodden and impoverished population, and this was a punch in the gut. It has come to light in major news sources that Glyphosate was used during this extreme drought, only adding literal fuel to the fires that are destroying homes, communities, and forests.

People are frustrated by a government that protects criminals, extols developers who destroy our land; in the same breath these people want to brutalize citizens for experiencing

nature, farming land, and having cohesive communities. You can rationalize each issue individually and conclude that these problems disrupt the wellbeing of all NS residents.

We are beat down, downtrodden, and it's easy to become complacent, angry, and reckless with reaction. Being angry is justified, though we should be constructive with its momentum.

As I look at out at my farm, I pity how parched it is, watching everything struggle to survive. It is a lot like our province; desiccated with every penny we make, pilfered by a broken system that will not give back.

Nova Scotians do not feel protected financially and medically, lack the right to produce food, do not feel safe from criminal elements, and lack major funding and resources to keep us safe. Our reactions are beyond the trail ban.

Political leaders are not upholding our needs. The only thing we have is each other, your common human being that you can share with, barter, support their business etc. Things are changing rapidly and the only constant we have is the human spirit and its ingenuity. We can work towards a better tomorrow and continue to combat greed and hypocrisy in Nova Scotia.

# An expected 1,000 people to flood the South Shore at 55+ Games

**SOUTH SHORE** – More than 800 competitors and close to 1,000 people altogether are expected to hit the South Shore for the bi-annual Nova Scotia 55+ Games Sept. 20-24.

The area last hosted the event in 2017.

People from across the province have a chance to compete in one of 24 different events, ranging from washer toss to swimming, and track and field to scrabble, during the Games.

What are the Nova Scotia 55+ Games?

“The Games allow participants to compete, stay active and push personal limits in a fun and inclusive environment. Whether you’re a seasoned competitor or trying a new sport for the first time, the Games foster friendly competition, camaraderie and personal achievement,” according to a statement on the Games’ website [www.ns55plus.ca](http://www.ns55plus.ca).

“Families and friends are encouraged to attend and cheer on their loved ones, creating a supportive and festive atmosphere at every venue.”

Andrew Tanner, co-chair of the Games with Joanne Fury, said that the Games... “are big for the whole region. We even have hockey taking place in Queens. It really supports the whole ecosystem, so to speak and it’s exciting. It’s going to be a good economic boon for the community as a whole.”

To register as an athlete, simply go to the Games website and click on the button, REGISTER NOW. Athletes can compete in more than one activity.

This will take you through the steps needed and anyone, 55 and over, can register to compete. Sev-

Players are divided into six provincial zones.

If you wish to be a part of the Games, but not as a competitor, you can still sign up to be a volunteer and organizers will find a spot for you. Again, simply go to the website and click on the button, VOLUNTEER NOW.

You can also register as a non-participant, which will allow you to take part in all the social activities of the Games.

If you want to just come out and cheer the participants on, you can for free.

There are just a few days left to register – Aug. 31 is the last day.

# Dory racing puts people above politics

LUNENBURG - Dory racing has united Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, and Gloucester, Massachusetts, for more than seven decades in a tradition that blends competition, community, and cross-border friendship.

Robert Fox, president of the Canadian Dory Racing Association, says the sport's 74-year history is both humbling and inspiring.

"You think about something that lasted for 74 years, and you're part of it to carry it on," Fox reflected. "Sometimes it doesn't feel like you're carrying anything on – it's just part of what you do."

Fox, who has rowed for 20 years and led the association for the past seven, recalls a time when the club's future was uncertain. "We were under \$50 in the bank account at one point," he said. But with renewed fundraising and community outreach, the group has since grown stronger, attracting more rowers and boosting its public profile.

For Bill Edmonds, president of the International Dory Racing Committee out of Gloucester, the appeal goes beyond competition. Having been involved since 1986, he describes the annual gatherings as more reunion than rivalry. "The biggest thing is the camaraderie," Edmonds said. "The races are almost secondary to just getting together."

Training is demanding, often involving lonely hours on the water, but both men agree the payoff comes when rowers line up to race before cheering crowds. "It's a blur of adrenaline," Edmonds explained. "Win or lose, you've accomplished something."

At the 74th International Dory Races held in Lunenburg Saturday, August 23, Canada claimed victory in five of the six divisions. The results were:

# Health Care rental housing project opens in Lunenburg

LUNENBURG – The doors were officially opened at the new health care rental housing project Aug. 18 at a special ceremony at its location on the old Wheelhouse Motel site.

This is the first phase of the project which features 13 residential units including a mix of studio, one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments. Three more units will become available early this fall at the complex.

Future development plans for the site include six, two-level, two-bedroom modular town home units slated to begin construction in late summer 2026.

Lunenburg MLA Susan Corkum-Greek, who was one of several officials who attended the event, said this will help with recruitment efforts of hard-working health care professionals.

“Our health care professionals are committed and hard-working and I am thrilled to welcome them home to Lunenburg,” said Corkum-Greek, on behalf of the provincial Minister of Growth and Development, Colton LeBlanc.

“Because of this new housing, we’ll be able to fill critical health care positions and recruit new health professionals who otherwise wouldn’t have been able to come here. This is an exciting day for our community and for our health care facilities.”

Since 2021, the government has invested \$283 million in 3,054 affordable units.

The Housing for Health Care program is a \$45 million provincial investment to ensure health care workers have access to safe and accessible housing in communities such as Bridgewater, Port Hawkesbury, Canso, Liverpool and New Glasgow.

The Housing Trust of Nova Scotia is overseeing the projects.

“The vibe was amazing. People were so happy at this event. The weather was perfect. Everyone was so positive and grateful for what we provided at the event,” said Tanya Veinotte Frowd, head of the organizing committee.

“I had several experienced officials tell me that this was their favourite provincials they had ever been to. I’m proud of our team, proud of our pool, proud of our town.”

She said the great facilities played a big part in the event’s success.

### Chocolate Chip Zucchini Bread

**INGREDIENTS:**

- 3 large eggs
- 3 cups shredded zucchini
- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 3 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon baking powder
- ½ cup chopped walnuts
- ½ cup chocolate chips

**DIRECTIONS:**

1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Grease and flour two 8X4-inch loaf pans.
2. Beat eggs in a large bowl until light and foamy. Mix in shredded zucchini, sugar, oil, and vanilla until thoroughly combined.
3. Whisk flour, cocoa powder, salt, baking soda, and baking powder together in a separate bowl; stir into zucchini mixture. Mix in nuts and chocolate chips. Pour batter into the prepared loaf pans.
4. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center of loaves comes out clean, about 1 hour. Let loaves sit in the pans for 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.

## A field trip to Cape Sable Island

*Bird Notes*

On Saturday, Aug. 16, my friend Tim Curnew and I made a trip to Cape Sable Island and to Baccaro.

I had five target birds, which were American oystercatcher, green heron, stilt sandpiper, yellow-crowned night heron and red knot. With birding, sometimes you get all your targets easily. Other times you bat zero. This was one of those other times.

It was still a great day with perfect weather, and we did see 55 species. I was able to get a few new birds for my year list, which were northern gannet and brown-headed cowbird. Seeing an eastern kingbird and a small flock of migrant warblers at Baccaro was a treat.

I didn't realize it, but I had a new year bird at Crescent Beach on Aug. 6, with a white-rumped sandpiper. I didn't know that I had seen it until I looked at photos, that I had taken on that day.

As of Aug. 20, things have been slow in regard to migrants passing through. The only warblers I saw in Lunenburg County, were common yellowthroat, yellow-rumped warbler and yellow warbler. Outside of Lunenburg County I had black-throated green warbler, and northern parula.

On Aug. 21, after writing this, a small group of migrants passed

through my yard in LaHave, which included northern parula, black-throated green warbler and chestnut-sided warbler.

There are still numbers of shorebirds moving through. At Crescent Beach on Aug. 14, I tallied nine semi-palmated sandpipers, 445 semi-palmated plovers, 48 short-billed dowitchers, 17 ruddy turnstones, 27 black-bellied plovers, one greater yellowlegs, and 27 sanderlings.

Aug. 15 produced 554 semi-palmated plovers, 33 black-bellied plovers, 115 short-billed dowitchers, four

ruddy turnstones, 22 semi-palmated sandpipers, and three willets. At Crescent Beach on Aug. 16, I saw 248 semi-palmated plovers, 81 short-billed dowitchers, 34 black-bellied plovers, three ruddy turnstones, three willets, one semi-palmated sandpiper, and nine least sandpipers.

On Aug. 17, William Paranteau discovered a lark sparrow at Summerville Beach.

Ray Wershler found a seaside sparrow at Hartlen's Point Aug. 17. As of Aug. 20, the wood stork was still being seen at Brier Island. I hope it

stays until Friday when I'll be there.

Logan Moore located 13 Baird's sandpipers in a single day. The high count was on Brier Island in 1967 when 15 were seen. A ton of reports are showing up across the province for this species.

On Aug. 20, Logan Moore discovered six Hudsonian godwits at the end of Breakwater Road. Mark Dennis found a laughing gull at Daniel's Head. A few stilt sandpiper reports have appeared across the province.

## The first time matters most

Leaders love to talk about morale, how important it is, how fragile it can be, how quickly it rises and falls. But here's the truth: you can't buy morale, and you can't fake it. You

build it, moment by moment, with every interaction you have with your team.

One of the most powerful tools in your leadership kit is also one of the simplest: how you respond the very first time someone comes to you with an idea.

That moment is a crossroads. If you listen closely, take their suggestion seriously, and show respect, even if you can't act on it, you create trust.

You show your team members that their voice matters. And when people feel heard, they keep contributing. They keep bringing you their ideas, their solutions, and their energy. That's how morale grows.

But if you dismiss the idea, brush it off, or worse, belittle it? That's the last time you'll hear from them. Not just that person, either. Others will see how you handled it and decide it's safer to stay quiet. Morale doesn't crash in one dramatic event, it erodes in small, careless moments.

### THINK ABOUT IT:

At an accounting firm, a junior staffer suggests a way to cut down on reporting time. If the partner brushes it off, that's the last suggestion you'll hear. Multiply that silence across the team, and innovation dries up.

At a trucking company, a dispatcher sees a scheduling tweak that could save fuel. If the manager listens, they've gained a problem-solver. Ig-

nore it, and the message is clear: "Just stick to your lane."

In hospitality, a server floats an idea to speed up table turns. If their manager leans in, asks questions, and shows genuine interest, that server becomes a partner in guest experience.

Shut it down, and they'll retreat to order taking only.

In retail, a floor associate notices a smarter way to merchandise for the season. Welcome it, and you unlock creativity. Dismiss it, and they'll stop offering, not because they don't have ideas, but because they don't trust you'll respect them.

See the pattern? Your first response is everything. You don't have to implement every idea, but you do have to respect the courage it took to bring it forward.

This is emotional intelligence in action. And if your team, or you as a leader, don't already have it, it's time to get there. Fast. Because no business grows without people who feel heard, valued, and invested.

## To get back on course

When events in our lives go awry, we may develop the perception that life is just one bad thing after another. It's overwhelming.

Some time ago, I asked, "What do you do when events throw you off course?" The suggestions that I received reminded me to discuss basic needs. Are we making efforts to satisfy them, despite the chaos?

Dr. Glasser asserts that we have a set of needs: survival/security, love/belonging, power/recognition, freedom, and fun. Paying attention to them is one good step toward gaining control of our lives.

For me, just having a list is a positive thing. It may sound trivial, but a list can help us move away from, "Everything is falling apart!" to "There are five things I have to attend to." I might not know how to deal with them, I may still have many uncertainties, but at least I know there are five things. It's a step toward taking control, toward putting a boundary around the problem.

With those needs in mind, here's an approach for responding when thrown off course.

First, look at survival/security. Am I keeping a regular schedule? Getting enough rest? Am I keeping to a diet that gives me adequate nutrition, with

a reasonable variety of healthy food? Is this within a budget that's comfortable for me?

Love/belonging: Am I caring for my important friend/family relationships? Am I sharing my concerns (to an appropriate degree)?

I've observed that people who take on the role of helper in a group are sometimes reluctant to share when they are having an upset of their own. The people closest to you may not even realize that you are struggling.

If you recognize yourself in that description, then you might not only ask, "Am I being supportive of my friends and family?" but also, "Am I accepting support? Do friends know that I need their support, even a listening ear?"

Power/recognition: Have I reminded myself that I have overcome difficulties in the past, possibly greater difficulties than the current ones? Am I keeping up with goals and activities in other areas (not just in the current problem area) so that I don't become overwhelmed by additional issues?

Freedom: What positive action can I take for an hour that would satisfy my need for freedom from this problem? (Positive action means it doesn't contribute to harm, such as excessive drinking, drugs, reckless behaviour.) I will deal with the issue again in an hour, but I will give myself one hour of freedom.

Fun: Smile. Even laugh. Even if you don't feel like it. Look for the absurd, the cute, the joy. I believe it's more effective if you don't get your fun at the expense of other people (such as by making fun of them). Instead, seek out the beautiful, the comic, the uplifting. Consider even tiny things that are fun for you; find a way to get at least a little bit of that into your life every day. When stressed, we often forget fun. But it's a need, not a frill.

Finally, while Dr. Glasser makes no faith-related statements (to my knowledge), I've been reminded both through reader comments and books that faith can be an essential component toward putting us back on course.

In one of my favourite Choice Theory books, *A Set of Direction for Putting and Keeping Yourself Together*, by Dr. Bob Wubbolding, he says, "...believing is a behaviour that can penetrate our plans and give hope for the future."

While many of us carefully plan for our families, our finances, and even our homes, it's equally important to have a plan for our pets. Having a safety net in place ensures that no matter what life brings, our furry companions will always be cared for.

Take Puddy, for example. This sweet nine-year-old tabby recently arrived at our shelter after the death of his owner. A naturally affectionate boy with a gentle soul, Puddy is understandably unsure in his new surroundings as he mourns the loss of

his home and the person he loved most.

Here's the truth: you can have the sharpest strategy, the best product, the slickest marketing. But if morale is low, none of it sticks. High morale isn't a "nice-to-have." It's the engine that powers productivity, loyalty, and reputation.



## Lunenburg council approves sale of Old Train Station

Council approved the sale of 18 Dufferin Street, known as the Old Train Station, to the Second Story Women’s Centre (SSWC) for \$383,403.

They have been leasing the space for several years to deliver programming that supports women and gender-diverse individuals in Lunenburg and surrounding areas.

### NEXT STEPS

Staff will now work with legal counsel to finalize a Purchase and Sale Agreement, which will come back to Council for review before it is signed. The agreement is expected to include:

- A Right of First Refusal, giving the Town the opportunity to repurchase the property if it’s ever resold

- A long-term easement to maintain public access to trail and parking areas around the building

- A commitment to consider heritage features in any future renovations, with input from a heritage consultant

While the building is not currently a designated municipal heritage property, council still has the option to explore heritage designation in the future, as allowed under provincial rules.


