MODL holds the line on property tax

MODL - The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (MODL) will hold the line on property tax for the coming year.

MODL council passed the 2025-2026 budget at their April 8 meeting and residential ratepayers will continue to pay \$0.81 per \$100 of assessment and regular commercial property owners will pay the same \$1.957 per \$100/assessment they did last year.

Council identified five areas they would focus on in the budget including: Infrastructure Upgrades, Expansion, and Management; Quality of Life, Affordability, and Social Inclusion; Regional Economic Development; Climate Change Action; and Communication and Engagement.

Mayor Elspeth McLean-Wile says council held the rates because they saw affordability as the priority in this budget.

"There is a significant increase in the Property Tax rebate program. This is targeted to help those who need it most, like seniors or people with lower incomes who are homeowners," she said.

"We have increased the budget from \$550,000 to \$753,400 which is the equivalent of reducing the tax rate by \$.02. We believe we lead the province outside of HRM with the amount returned to low-income homeowners."

MODL council approved an annual operating budget of \$46,693,200, that has a projected surplus of \$120,600. Between the cap-

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ital budget and Canada Community-Building Fund the municipality will invest a total of \$18,370,100 in the district over the next year.

Some of the big-ticket items on their list include \$6.5 million to increase capacity at the Cookville Wastewater Treatment Plant, \$2 million to build the Community Hub space in the Lumia Collaborative Health Centre in Osprey Village, and \$150,000 to buy a transit bus to service Osprey Village and the surrounding areas.

Mayor McLean-Wile says creating reliable transit is a major pillar of the plan to make the region more affordable for people. Said McLean Wile, "I am most excited to have included in the budget for 2025-26 funding

for the first steps in delivering public transit to the municipality. We are working with the town to connect the communities that surround the town and connect Osprey Village with public transit."

McLean-Wile said they will rely on Bridgewater's experience to get the service up and running.

"This is the first major initiative of our two municipalities working together with this council. We are relying on the experience of the town to develop the most cost effective and efficient routes; they will be responsible for the day-to-day operation and we will cost share on the operation," she said.

Lunenburg fundraiser has a new name, same goal

LUNENBURG – The annual BURG Classic changed its name this year to better reflect the origins of the event.

Since 2013, volunteers have come together to raise money in support of locals who have experienced life-altering changes, which are usually related to medical issues. The money is used to help ease the burden on people in tough times to allow them to focus on healing and spending time with their families.

Event chair Jayme Niford says the event began in 2013 to help his mother, Jennifer Collins. Collins had an accident in 2009 which left her paralyzed from the neck down. He said when she passed in January last year a light bulb went off that the event should be renamed in her honour.

Niford said, "It's clearly the Jennifer Collins Classic. It was started for her, it was all about her, that's the reason why we started, and it creates a bit of a legacy for folks in the community to really remember why we started this and to just, honour mom for years to come."

Niford describes Collins as the ultimate sports-mom. She was always on the go when he and his two brothers Jacob and Dana were children, supporting the boys in the multiple sports they were involved in. Niford said his mother was a bundle of energy, "always a smile on her face. When she walked into the room she just, [had a] bubbly kind of attitude and always brought the room up in a positive way."

The Jennifer Collins Classic has come a long way since it began as an eight-team tournament

and dance in 2013. The fundraiser now hosts 22 teams across three divisions in the weekend-long event and dance. An annual battle of the burger challenge supported by over a dozen area eateries also contributes \$1 to \$2 from each burger sold to the group's efforts and organizers run a golf tournament in May.

The Classic raised \$15,000 each of the first three years and watched donations swell in the following years to the point where it cracked the \$100,000 mark in single-year donations last year. Niford says that since the fundraiser began, organizers have raised \$420,000. He expects to exceed the \$100,000 target they set for this year, bringing the grand total raised to over a half a million dollars.

Anyone who is local to the area, active in the community and, in Niford's words, has been dealt a bad hand can apply for funding from the Jennifer

Collins Classic. The group has an online submissions page, and all applications are reviewed by a panel of board members to determine what help will be offered.

Niford says interestingly, people don't ask for help themselves. "This is a small town and people don't like asking for help, so sometimes it's actually hard to give money away."

Niford said in recent years the Jennifer Collins Classic has earned a solid reputation for helping and has worked to develop privacy policies to protect the identities of those it helps. He says it is usually friends and family members who recognize people's need and put them forward as potential recipients.

Niford said the nine-person committee works hard all year to drive the Jennifer Collins Classic and anyone wishing to volunteer can reach out to any of the members or make contact through the web page www.jennifercollinsclassic.com.

"It is the first important step in building out public transit into the municipality and relying on the expertise of our neighbour to work with us to make it happen in a timely and cost-efficient way."

MODL council also emphasized the

need to support lower income households by investing more in the Property Tax rebate program. Mayor McLean-Wile said, Council has committed to starting the budget process earlier next year. They look to begin in November when they will reconfirm or refine the strategic priorities and then follow with the budget planning process.

Seniors travelling solo

The senior years bring with them many transitions; changes in our physical appearance, possible reduction in cognitive abilities or illness, smaller social circles, or the loss of a spouse, for example. Often, as well, there is a loss of self-confidence and independence; a sense of lost control in daily lives.

But it doesn't have to be like this; there are ways for seniors to connect with their world. One great way is travelling alone, which offers a sense of freedom which many now appreciate. But it requires pre-planning with precautions to consider.

Once you've decided on a destination, it's best to make arrangements for accommodation especially for the first night upon arrival, when you'll likely be tired. Compare booking sites and deals by checking various sites or do the research entailed for the best offers and flights, which can vary on a daily basis.


If considering a tour package, pick the right tour for you that involves seeing top sights of interest unique to you. This can make your visit stress-free. Although you may have a list of things you'd like to see and do, sometimes that's not always possible. You can always save these ventures for your next possible trip.

- If considering a leisurely cruise by yourself, it may prove better to select a long weekend rather than an extensive trip for a couple weeks. Some cruise lines may charge single supplements. It will also offer some kind of sense of adventure; whether it's the one for you or not.

- Check your cellphone battery, which may become lower after photo taking, texting and resorting to Google Maps. In a pinch you don't want to be left with no phone service.

- Let family and others know of your proposed itinerary, not to impede your independence, but to be assured that others know what you're going to be doing and when. A printed copy of the plans on your own or with a group is advised. Call or text often to those that may be concerned.

- If your home will be empty at the time, don't publicly share this fact on social media. There will be plenty and photos and stories to share when you arrive home.



- Always be aware and alert of your surroundings, particularly if a place or someone makes you feel uncomfortable. Go with your instincts, and don't feel obligated to go on a tour or accept handouts from those on the streets. Conversing is fine; you don't want to be rude, but always consider your safety first.

- Criminals are always looking for ways to take advantage of travelers; especially when you're distracted or being too overly trusting; pickpockets can be a concern. Leave your passport in your hotel and don't carry substantial amounts of cash, credit cards or other forms of identification with you. Only carry what you need for the day in a secure cross body bag or a money bag.

- When travelling overseas, obtain some of the local currency, including small denominations since some places will only accept cash such as coffee shops for your light snack on your travels. You may also want to tip the hotel staff for helping you with your bags or

offer other services.

- Consider buying travel insurance. Flight cancellations, baggage losses, accidents, and illnesses happen, and you'll appreciate the comfort of knowing you're covered.

- If you can do so, try to travel as lightly as possible. Consider whether packaging all those items is really necessary. You want your baggage to be as manageable as possible without requiring assistance from others.

- Learning a bit about the local language will come in handy which the locals will appreciate. They can be a good source of information about recommended cafes or sites of intrigue. Even learning a few phrases wouldn't hurt.

Senior solo travelling allows you to see what you really want and set your own pace to do so. It's both an exhilarating and memorable experience that sparks your wonderlust. It requires courage and self-confidence to step out of your comfort zone while experiencing all this world's wonders.

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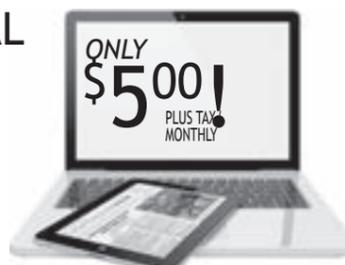

South Shore Players presents: *Three to Get Married*

BRIDGEWATER – You don't want to miss this! The South Shore Players (SSP) presents a comedy of "love and manners" in a play entitled, *Three to Get Married*, written by Kay Hill.

This spring production is set in Aylesford in the 1830s and tells the story of a conscientious and highly resourceful minister attempting to marry off his three daughters.

Find out how he did by attending one of six performances. May 2, 3, 9 and 10 are evening performances starting at 7 p.m. and matinees May 4 and 11 beginning at 2 p.m.

The play, with a cast of 10, is directed by Nancy Wilson, who further described that it is based on a true incident.

"This is when the stagecoach was coming through from Halifax to Annapolis. Indeed, there was a pastor who opened his rectory to visitors who were going on that ride," she said.

"He had three daughters who needed to be married, so this was also an opportunity to find somewhat suitable perspective bridegrooms."

There are five different suitors involved and they're from all walks of life and there's one dress that the three daughters must share so they look presentable to these suitors.

The cast is made up of more men than women – six men and four women – something a bit different for SSP productions.

"This is a huge anomaly for South Shore Players. It is extremely difficult to get men to want to go on stage for our productions," said Producer David Friendly. "This is really quite amazing."

Wilson jokingly said that initially she thought she may have to go and recruit more men and possibly even enlist Friendly, although that would only be in desperation.

"I was delighted. We had 14 men who auditioned. We had a selection, and I was very happy about that."

Auditions were held in November, and the group formally started to rehearse in January.

WHY THIS PLAY?

SSP have as a sub-committee of script readers that helps choose plays, along with the director.

"I knew I wanted to do a full-length play and one with at least eight-to-10 characters. I also knew I wanted it to be a period piece," said Wilson. "I read four different scripts... some of them contemporary, Norman Foster type of plays, then I presented it to the script reading committee and so collectively, we decided on this one."

Five questions to ask when in a conflict

Some people take a spontaneous seat-of-the-pants approach to life, while others find structure more satisfying. Personally, I find structure helpful: shopping lists, appointment calendars, journal reminders. Tools of this sort may not work perfectly, but they can help us develop a sense of control over our lives.

But structure isn't just useful for keeping track of appointments. Dr. Glasser used a structured approach for marriage counselling which he described in "Counselling with Choice Theory." His relationship counselling approach featured five questions. Those questions, or similar questions, are useful for other situations too.

Let's look at his five questions.

In a previous column, I'd mentioned that Glasser's opening question is, "Are you here because you want help for your marriage?" Your first thought might be, "Well, that's a no-brainer; why else would they come to counselling?"

We can sometimes believe that we want help to resolve a problem, but when it comes down to the details, it turns out that we want something else.

In a difficult relationship, maybe what we most want is to be acknowledged as the good guy, with the other person shown at fault. Maybe we want to be free of the relationship, but we don't want to admit it. Maybe we want to be able to tell our friends, "I tried everything, even counselling, but nothing could save us."

Thus, Glasser's question is aimed at getting agreement that the relationship is the priority. Unless both people are prepared to work toward helping the relationship, there is no value to continuing.

The second question is probably familiar to you: "Whose behaviour can you control?" We know the answer. We might not like the answer, but we know it. We can each only control our own behaviour.

Having both people acknowledge this reality can reduce the impulse to try to control each other and deflect

from our own responsibility. Phrases like "If she would only..." or "This wouldn't be a problem if he..." don't work so well when we acknowledge what we can and can't control.

The third question is, "What do you believe is wrong with the marriage right now?" Each person can present their perspective. Glasser doesn't take a side in the dispute. No matter how the "wrongs" are presented, or who might be more at fault, his position is that he is on the side of the marriage, not on the side of one or the other of the parties. The marriage is the priority.

The fourth question might come as a surprise: "What is good about the marriage right now?"

Fascinating, eh? Two people come with a dispute, probably a serious marriage-threatening dispute, and Glasser asks them what is good in their marriage. Is there anything good?

Coming up with an answer to this question could shift perspectives. Two people involved in a long-running dispute may have become so detached

from each other that any good is long forgotten.

Yet, at one time, there had been good, or they wouldn't have married. Some good may remain, but it's become overshadowed. It's "good" to find that again.

The final question is a challenge to both parties. "What is one thing you could do in the coming week that would make the marriage better?" Then do it. For the week. Report back.

Note that he is asking for something that you can do; that's under your control. As you are saying it openly, your partner will know what to expect and whether it happens. Both commit to doing something positive.


Highlights of the 2023/2024 CBC's

Bird Notes

I recently received my Nova Scotia Bird Society Newsletter Vol. 66, Issue 2 Winter 2023-24. The Christmas Bird Counts for Nova Scotia is covered.

For the National Audubon Society this was the 124th year for counts all over North America, plus recently Central and South America and islands of the North Pacific were included. Nova Scotia joined the counts in 1917.

For the 2023-24 season in Nova Scotia, 33 separate counts were done by 954 participants. For the provincial CBCs in Nova Scotia there were rec-

ord highs for several species including: Canada geese, 25,863; mallard, 11,247; harlequin duck, 508; Barrow's

goldeneye, 117; red-throated loon 74; Cooper's hawk, 18; peregrine falcon, 15, and ruby-crowned kinglet, 31.

On the downside, 52 boreal chickadees was the lowest count ever. This number was a third less than the 10-15-year average. The house sparrow count was also the lowest in history with 427.

A MacGillivray's warbler was a first record for a Nova Scotia CBC found by David Bell and Dominic Cormier. A gray heron in Yarmouth County was also a first for the CBCs.

Dorothy Poole sighted an American Woodcock in Brooklyn during early April. Peter and Pam Haughn had a Carolina wren show up at their feeders

on Heckman's Island on April 8.

Kerry Jarvis reported a great blue heron in Riverport on Apr. 9, as well as three double-crested cormorants in Bridgewater. I saw my first osprey for the current year back behind the old Cineplex in Bridgewater on April 10. Charlene Meister-MacDonald saw it earlier that day.

Sandy Marshall noticed activity at what was a previous osprey nest in Lunenburg. Bald eagles were seen mating and actively adding sticks to the nest. I will keep an eye on the nest and let you know if they are successful in raising young.

What's worth it? Rethinking the cost of commitment

A quick note before we go further:
While this conversation is rooted in hospitality, the message applies beyond. If you're a manager, owner, or leader in any sector, simply swap out the word "hospitality" for your own.
The core issue remains the same: We cannot continue to expect total personal sacrifice from our people and still wonder why they leave.
Spring is blooming in Nova Scotia. Patios are being uncovered, menus are being finalized, and staff meetings are happening all over the province as operators prepare for the rush of another season.
Underneath the hopeful energy of spring lies a tension we can't ignore anymore.
This past week, I read a LinkedIn post that resonated deeply. It painted

a picture of the pride and camaraderie found in hospitality, the long hours, the high pace, the beautiful, chaotic dance of service. It reminded me of everything I've loved about this industry for three-plus decades.
It also broke my heart. Among the stories of teamwork and resilience was an all too familiar theme: the glorification of sacrifice.
We talk about missing holidays, birthdays, graduations, long weekends, and life milestones as if they're unavoidable sacrifices, part of what's required to "make it" in the industry.
They're treated like rites of passage. Spoken about with a mix of pride and resignation, as if the ability to give up everything personal is the ultimate proof of dedication.
We've accepted this as normal.
Here's what I need every hospitality leader to hear: This mindset is the root of our labour shortage.

It's not just about wages or competition. It's about how we treat people.
It's about what we expect them to give up and what we fail to give back.
We tell them, "It's hard, but it's worth it." But I ask you: worth what?
Is it worth it to be told your only value is your availability every night, every weekend, every holiday?
Let me be clear: I'm not suggesting hospitality comes without effort.
It is a demanding industry. It asks a lot of us. There will be some late nights, some tough weekends, some moments when the team has to rally.
There's a difference between "giving your all" and being expected to give "everything."
The teams that stay, the ones who thrive, are led by managers who understand this difference.
Leaders who say:
"We will find a way to honour your life and your work."
"We'll staff smart, offer flexibility, and create space for people to be whole humans not just scheduled bodies."
"We're done with hustle culture. We're building a culture of care."
If the hospitality industry wants to recover and thrive, we must stop romanticizing burnout and start prioritizing balance.
The truth is, our guests can feel the difference.

A team that's treated with respect, flexibility, and fairness delivers service that's rooted in joy, not obligation.
Isn't that the experience we're trying to create?
This spring, as the season begins, I urge every operator, manager, and leader to ask themselves:
Are we building a workplace people want to be part of?
Do our expectations reflect care, or just tradition?
Are we truly seeing our people or are we just scheduling them?
Let's retire the phrase "It's hard but it's worth it."
And let's embrace a new one:
"It's fulfilling. It's people first. And it's absolutely worth doing because we're doing it differently now."
Our industry was built on the idea of looking after others.
It's time we turned that same level of care inward, toward the people who make it all possible. Because the future of hospitality depends on it.

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Breakfast Casserole

Bacon, eggs, and sausages! Oh my!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pkg Frozen hash brown potatoes
- 1 lb Pork sausage
- 1 pkg bacon
- 5 large eggs
- ½ cup milk
- 1 cup diced vegetables of your choice (e.g., onions, green peppers)
- 1 can sliced mushrooms
- 1 pkg shredded marble cheddar cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste

PREPARATION

- Fry the sausage and crumble it. Drain excess grease and set aside.
- Fry the bacon and crumble it. Drain excess grease and set aside.

DIRECTIONS

1. Grease an 8-inch square casserole dish and preheat the oven to 350F / 175C.
2. Add the hash brown potatoes to the dish in an even layer.
3. Whisk eggs, milk, salt, and pepper together in a large bowl until well combined. Pour over the potatoes and sprinkle with ½ of the cheese.
4. Add sausage mixture on top and sprinkle with remaining cheese.
5. Crumble the bacon over the top of the cheese and cover with casserole with aluminum foil.
6. Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour. Remove foil; return casserole to the oven and bake until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean (about 10 minutes).

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
